The Society was started in the following manner;

The 1961 Reurion in Chicago was so pleasant that I looked forward to the proposed 1963 Cleveland reunion with great pleasure. However this event was never held, so in 1973 I began an attempt to assemble a list of 99ers by means of Christmas Greetings. By 1978 I had only 24 names, and in 1979 I obtained only one additional name. Clearly that was not the way to go. So I next put a notice in the American Legion Magazine for any 99ers who were interested in a reunion to write to me. This did not produce a single answer, perhaps because the Editor put my name in bold print and the outfit name in fine print. So that didn't work either.

However, as a result of my advertisement, Leo Gallegos called me and told me that I was eligible to join the Albuquerque Chapter of the 8th AF Historical Society as an Associate Member. I joined at once, and subsequenly learned from the 8AFHS Newsletter how to go about finding the Group. Incidently, there are about 300 members in the Albuquerque 8AFHS Chapter, thanks primarily to Bet ty and Leo Gallegos.

So I charged in and set up a reunion for October, 1980 at Amarillo, TX. This enabled me to put notices in the DAV, VFW, and Legion Magazines, and then the letters began to come in. Robert Wood, Frank English, Ed Zawila and many others contributed their mailing lists and we began the task of up-dating the addresses.

We expected a modest gathering of locals from the Southwest, but we got Ted Panek from New Jersey, Tom Read from Michigan, Joe Kenney from Wyoking, Mike Marina from South Dakota, Rex Greathouse from Kansas, as well as Hank Parks, R.N.Daniels, Rich Bradfute and myself from the aforesaid Southwest.

So, in the midst of a bomb scare, we organized. Dues were set at 35 for 1931, Joe Kenney was elected Secretary, and I was elected Chairman and was authorized to expend a maximum of 3500 in the search for 99ers. Reunions were planned, committees were appointed, and the Chairman was directed to present by-laws and a constitution for consideration at the Albuquerque Reunion in April.

The April 1931 Reunion in Albuquerque drew about 40 members. The by-laws and constitution were amended and then adopted. The reunion was also a social success. Dues for 1982 were set at \$10.

A reunion was also held in Rapid City, SD in July, 1931, with Like Marina and his wife Lettie as hosts. This too was a memorable affair.

The persistent search for 99ers has continued, and the mailing list now exceeds 400. Number One on our list is General Upthegrove, whom we located in January. Membership lists are furnished regularly, and a small mewsletter is published six times a year.

Meanwhile the organization had begun to function as an aid to historians as well as a social club. The BBC, the Czech archivist, and an Italian engineer are all on our mailing list.
