#### GREETINGS:

The Wind River Mountains just above us were pretty bare but are now under more than two feet of this recent snow, very good for a beginning on the winter's snow pack. It has cleared and right at this moment the outside air temperature is 9° below zero! So from this very crisp and white background, HAPPY NEW YEAR!

One of the privileges each of us has is in the reading of the many books written by men who fought during WWII and sharing their experiences in a manner in which we all can identify. A book I read recently entitled 'Hitler's Last Great Offensive," literally what we knew as "the Belgian Bulge" covered all aspects very well and gives an insite on just how very well our own American soldiers performed when they were really against the blaze. Another book entitled "Stalingrad" was written first in 1943 by Heinz Schröter who was a German 6th Army Correspondent. This describes in detail how Hitler totally consigned the German 6th Army into oblivion at Stalingrad. Of the 364,000 men of that great army, only 5,008 soldiers ever returned to Germany, an awesome casualty rate of 98.7%.

Early on in their Russian offensive the German Army Headquarters was set was set up "in the shadow of the Column of Peace in Red Square" of the City of Poltava. Many of us visited Poltava and have that certain identity with it.

Bill Smallwood, well known to most of us in the 99th, has written a book which has now been just released. I look foreward to receiving my copy of this book entitled 'Tomlin's Crew." I have a personal interest in this since their radio operator was a friend, we'd joined the 346th Squadron together. His name is David Gratt.

As we contemplate the horrible things brought about by Hitler, his utter ruthlessness toward those he conquered, to those soldiers under his command, an absolute Tyrant, our own identity comes through the fact that we faced these same terrible forces. We know of Stalin's ruthless ways, and most recently the power displayed by Sadam Hussein under the same ruthless foremat. This Nation simply has to remain strong to maintain the freedoms we fought for so long ago.

After the war he became one of the leading engravers for the postal service, designing many of the postage stamps in use today. I bought the "17" at an art show in Laguna Beach last August. The full title is: Nostalgia X - "You Ought to see the Other Guy". My copy is number 393 of 400. He also displayed action type etchings of P-51's, P-38's, P-47's and others.

Dear Joe:

While I did attend the 99th BG reunion at Albuquerque, I was unable to attend at Rapid City, so I was not with Marle Smith, our ball turret gunner, and Walt Harbeson, our copilot.

As stated by Marle, the ten men of our original crew were all shot down on four different flights. This would lead one to believe that there safer professions. In response to your suggestion I am adding my bit of experience to that of our crew.

The remaining original seven of us, along with three replacement crewmen, were downed on the infamous December 29th, 1944 Innsbruk mission. On that mission we were leading the 346th squadron. As we approached the target area I notified Mac McClanahan, our 1st pilot, that we were being led off course, and were heading over a concentration of guns. We then sustained two hits, starting fires in the bomb bay and in the left wing. Mac notified the formation, and we pulled out. I gave a new heading to Switzerland, and efforts were made to extinguish the fires. It was soon evident that we could not stay airborn, the alarm was sounded, and we bailed out.

Upon reaching the ground, I was immediately taken captive by SS ski troops. The SS group was assembled in the dining hall of their headquarters, and I was brought in. The CO of the group repeatedly asked me where we were based. Each time, when I did not respond, I received a blow. After this had gone on for a period of time, the CO screamed that they were going to shoot me. They removed my flight jacket, and led me outside to the back of the headquarters with a gun in my back. This was the Alps in the winter, and it was freezing cold. I was certain that my time was up. I was kept outside for about an hour, waiting for the shot.

I was then led back into the building. I now assumed that this had been a scare tactic, and that the questioning would resume. Instead, I was thrown into the basement. There was no repeat interrogation at this location. I was subsequently turned over to the Luftwaffe, where I joined others of my crew.

From that point on my experiences were much the same as Harvey Jennings. At Dulag Luft, located at Oberursel, Germany, I was in solitary confinement for five days, interrogated daily, and gave no information. The interrogator then got out a large portfolio on the 99th BG. He then told me a great amount of information about me personally, as well as a considerable amount of very detailed information about the 99th. He knew far more than I did.

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If any former 99th BG POWs who read this may wonder how the Luftwaffe could have such complete information on our aircrews, I would refer them to the book "The Interrogator" by Raymond Tolliver. In this book are pictures of the man who interrogated me, Leutnant Haussmann; he was in charge of bomber crew interrogation.

The lesson for me, derived from my experiences on the 29th of December, 1944 is this. For a survivor, each day thereafter is a precious bonus
