

RESPONSES TO PICTURES PLACED IN NOV. LETTER

In Newsletter, Volume 14 #4, November 1944 on page 35, this picture is the crew of Captain Leonard Smith. Those in the picture front row L. to R. Leonard Smith Pilot, Nick Lykos Bombadier, George Coffin Ball, Al Wilcox Navigator, (Al has passed away) Leon Estes Waist, Bob Cleanthes Radio. Back row Ben McConnell Engineer, Mac has passed away, Vic "Fab" Fabiniak Tail, Fred Shorten Waist, and our Co-Pilot Conrad "POPS" Headley.

This crew began training May 1944 at Draw Field Tampa Fla. Finished our training August 1944. After a short furlough, we met at Hunter Field Georgia August 1944. We were assigned a B-17-G #44-6445 which brought us to the 99th Bomb Group on Sept. 9th 1944. Arriving that day also was the crew of Fred Troy, in a B-17-G #44-8159, both of these two B-17s did not stay in the Bomb Group.

History of these two B-17s is, Smitties #44-6445 was assigned to the 301 st. Bomb Group, it was missing in action over Vienna on March 16, 1945. Troys B-17 #44-8159 was assigned to the 483rd Bomb Group, it was missing in action on March 24,1945 over Berlin.

Feb. 27 1945 Len Smiths crew flew squadron lead for the 346th, the target was Augsburg, we were tail end charlie squadron for the 99th, also of the Fifth Wing, all six Bomb Groups participated this day. We lost two engines over the target, had to leave the Group. Smitty had us jettisonout everything we could and get ready to bail out if we had to. We all agreed to stay with our airdraft as long as possible heading for Switzerland. We made it, we landed ar Dubendorf with an ascort of two Swiss ME 109s. Len Smith and our Co-Pilot this day, John Morat should have received D.F.C.s for nursing this B-17 #44-8187 into Switzerland on One Good Engine.

This Crew was made up of Len Smith, Pilot, John Morat Co-Pilot Al Wilcox Navigator, Walt Mucek Bombadier, Paul Shank Mickey, Ben McConnell Engineer, Fred Shorten and Leon Estes Waist, I Victor Fabiniak Tail.

The five officers and flight engineer were repatriated and returned to the 99th about two weeks later. Fischbach, Shorted, Estes and Fabiniak remained Interned until May 17, 1945 and returned to the states for re-assignment. I, Vic Fab received a 90 day furlough and 30 days R+R in Miami Florida.

Want to find a Crew Member? Call the V.A. #1800-827-1000. tell them you are looking for a fellow crew member, give the Name and Service number, this is a must, social security number if you have it. If this person has a V.A. claim number, they will give you instructions, they will also tell you if they have passed away.

Many libraries have a C.D. ROM telephone directory. It has all the names in the U.S., that have a telephone, alphibetically, just imagine how many Smiths there are, some have a Microfiche listing, these are by City and State.

Want you Missing in Action crew report (MACR#). Write to the Military Field Branch, Military Archieves Division, 4205 Suitland Rd. Suitland MD. 20409. When writing, give names of two officers and yours, date of MIssing in Action, Unit, Target, they will send you a Microfiche film that has all the data but they will reguest a fee if they have it before they send it. Cost six years ago was Five Bucks. Expect five to six weeks for a response.

You can also write to Record Processing Center. Attn. Ms. Alice Hunter, P.O. Box 5020 St. Louis, Mo. 63115. Request the same information also give who you are seeking. If you are looking for someone in the Dallas Texas area, contact Ms. T.R. Jones 1551 N.W. 19th St., Grand Praire, Texas 75050. I have not used the two people in the last couple of years but give it a shot. Expect a answer about five or six weeks also.

I am the Chairman of the Swiss Internees Association search committee. I have located over 900 Internees which have a membership of 510. There were 166 aircraft come to Switzerland, 1582 internees. Many have passed away and many want to forget the War.

Back to the picture of the crew. The Nose Art has Bugs Bunny, remarks says "It's BuBu Doc" "Bugs Buddy". Does anyone know the number of this B-17-G? It is not 44-6450.

Bernie, this is a little more information on Leonard Smiths crew. Nick Lykos, Bombadier, was K.I.A., December 26, 1944 over Blechhammer.

The February 27th mission over Augsburg, the day we lost #1 and #2 engines over the target, later we lost #4, it could not be feathered and it windmilled.

Flying on our wing this day was the crew of Shields and Bob Moser. They had a direct hit over the target, the crew all bailed out and were P.O.W.s. Shields the Pilot was K.I.A. The other members of this crew that I know are Charlie Jones, Dwight Reigert and Jerry Knowlton, Also Fran Grantz who is our host for the reunion in St. Louis in May. In 1987 I was able to make contact with the family of Jerry Knowlton, Jerry passed away in 1980. Jerry and I met up in Camp Lucky Strike, La Harve France on our way home to the States, May 1945.

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Dear Bernie

I was pleasantly surprised to see a picture of our old airplane THE WARRIOR in the November newsletter. First, I would like to say that the plane flew a lot more than 16 missions. It would be more like 60 missions. The original crew completed most if not all their 50 missions in the Warrior. I was the original pilot and later became Squadron Operations Officer. Thus I completed my missions after my crew. The Warrior was still flying missions after I left the 347th Squadron.

Enclosed are two copies of pictures of the Warrior and the original crew taken at the Brookley Depot in Mobile, Alabama just before leaving for North Africa. The picture by the tail is the full crew: from left to right starting with the second row is: A.E. Capestro, waist gunner (deceased) Fred Mannship, radio operator (Killed in action but not in the Warrior); Yours truly Bill Clark, pilot; Paul Commons, navigator (Killed in Flight Training); Ted Holmes, co-pilot (killed in action in B- 29s out of Siapan); Jack Buckner, bombadier. First row William Murphy, engineer (where abouts unknown); Joe Cepparulo, tail gunner; Dick Messner, ball turret operator; L.T. Gosselin, waste gunner. Thanks for your efforts;

TOM GAERTNER 562 West St. Wadsworth, OH 44281 writes...."I along with 19 others were assigned to the 99th BG as replacement gunners, because one of the crew had to stay in the U.S. and go over with the ground crews. (L.T. Gosselin) I was assigned to the WARRIOR #474, our crew was #13." His first mission was to Naples on 4-4-43 and last was to Veterbo on 9-18-43. Tom flew all of his 50 missions in #474 and in addition the plane flew many more. From the following article taken from the 99th 300 mission log you will see that the plane completed 96 missions out of 102 attempts. EL DIABLO, SWEATER GIRL, and the WARRIOR are featured here.

Two Original Forts

Adorned with painted bombs; swastikas, and patched flak holes, they stand proudly in their revetments, veterans of many com-Stripped of their arms, but not of their dignity, these aircraft, original ships of the original crews made the Atlantic crossing in Feb-

ruary 1943.
Two of these majestic bearers of ill tidings to the Axis are still with us and performing perhaps a little less glorious task than their younger "sister soldiers of the skies," the G's, but still serving ever-loyally the Group which has cared for them.


The Warrior, or as the records assigned to the 347th Squadron, and with Master Sergeant Walter K. Boothe, crew chief, nursing her veterans. through her ills, flew 96 combat missions. Out of 102 attempts, only six times did she turn back from the goal.

Aircraft number 49472, or Sweater Girl, a 416th ship, got her name from the voluptuous replica of femininity which adorns her Still With Group of terminity which should be airlanes frame. This lady of the airlanes flew 111 missions in combat, a mark made possible by careful handling by the crews in the air and by the ground crew chiefed by Master Sergeant Chester A. Smiechowski.

Another one of these "Queens bat missions, the B-17 F's now used of the Air" is no longer with us, but as transport ships with the 99th, one well worthy of mention, Number 29513, with 121 missions cred-

> ited to her, bears the name "El Diablo." At present flying General Upthegrove hither and yon, at a B-24 Wing in this theater, "El Diablo" earned the respect of our former commanding officer who requested her transfer to him. Gen. Upthegrove well knows what "The Devil" can do, he should for he ferried her across the Atlantic himself nearly two years ago.

They have served us well in comcarry her. A/C number 29474, is bat, are serving us as transports, and may they continue to serve as they have done, veterans among

That was by far the best and well written Air Force World War 11 story, 4th mission to Ploesti as told by John Plummer, looking at it through the eyes of a B-17 combat crew member that I have ever read. That would truly make a great war movie. It seems almost impossible that a B-17 could lose number 2 engine over the target, five minutes later also lose number 4 engine, and then make it back to home base. I can only say, the pilot did a heroic, hell of a good job to bring that plane back to Foggia, Italy. I could relate well to the whole story as I also had flown combat missions to the Ploesti oil fields four times before then with the Highfill crew as engineer-gunner. Here I must say that Thompson N. Highfill was the absolute best, cool under pressure pilot that I have ever flown with in my twenty years of Air Force flying.

I can understand a few good points made to this story by Col. C.L. Sluder as seen through the eyes of an escort fighter pilot. But then too I must agree with Gen. Curtis LeMay who said, "the only fighter planes I saw after leaving the target all had black German crosses painted on them." However to my surprise on one combat mission soon after leaving the target I did see one of our P-38's. There it was close behind us, a little below our formation of bombers over northern Italy looking for a bit of self protection flying only on one engine, with the other engine propeller feathered. He stayed with us for nearly an hour before leaving us to make it on his own.

After I flew 50 missions with the 99th Bomb. Group I returned to the states in a war weary B-17 with then Col. K.K. Compton, a young West Pointer who was in charge of 15th Air Force Path Finder or Radar bombing, on a fast trip for a meeting at the Pentagon. This was only a four man crew with Col. Compton as pilot, a Capt. co-pilot, a navigator and me as engineer. Compton would make a short stop at home to see his wife at St. Joseph, Mo. before going on to Washington. Along the way our navigator left our crew at Nashville, Tenn. Then on to St. Joseph where Compton left the plane not to return. So with Capt. now as pilot and me sitting in the co-pilot seat the two of us took off to deliver the war weary B-17 to its destination, Tinker A.F. base at Okla. City.

Then later while waiting for my reassignment at Alexander, La. the First Sgt. came to my tent with a sad story. Agroup of B-17's had just finished combat trainning and was ready to leave for overseas, an engineer-gunner had gone to the hospital, and would I take his place on the crew?? I did not like the idea but after a long minute I said OK. So soon in a new B-17 I was off to England to fly 30 more missions in the 487th Bomb. Gp. By now the German Air Force was somewhat weaker and not as much of a problem as seen before in the 99th B.G. But Germany did come up with a few fast jet ME-262 fighter planes. I want to say one thing in thanks to the 99th Bomb. Gp., no where else would I ever see that real close, tight formation flying which I am certain in my mind saved a lot of our lives I can remember several times the German fighters would pass up the 99th group formation to hit a loose flying group of other B-17's. Flying combat was a great experience but I would not like to ever do it again.

Dear Bernie:




